Ready to Work?

I was 10 years old and not worth the \$1.65/hour I was paid by my uncle. It was my first "job." Alongside my brother and two cousins, I worked on the celery harvester, picking out any yellow leaves before the celery was put into crates.

All of us have memories of our first job. They are coming-of-age moments. They are one of the first times when we step away from the direct supervision of our parents and learn that there are going to be other people in our lives that will tell us what to do.

I did not enjoy having to go to work. Even though it was only a dozen hours or so a week, it just was not the same as playing baseball with my neighbors or trading sports cards with a friend. If I were given the choice to work, I would have said "umm, no, thanks. I will just play instead." But I was not given a choice. I do not recall any discussion. It was simply, "boys, you will be working for Uncle Jim when school gets out." I am glad my parents did not try to follow today's parenting advice and let me make the decision. Surely, I would have chosen my bike any day over muck.

But just because work is not exciting, it does not mean work is degrading or harmful. There is something fundamentally fulfilling about work. I am not referring to financial fulfillment or some other material fulfillment. Rather, we were created to work. When we work, we are fulfilling a God-ordained creaturely purpose. Like a plant devoid of nutrients, without work, we develop both physical and mental problems. I have a hunch we would solve half the mental troubles in young people if they were given an appropriate diet of work.

Work is not a product of sin. While sin has certainly impacted work, it existed before the Fall. God designed and directed His creatures to be fruitful and multiply; to subdue the earth and have dominion over it (Gen. 1:28). This includes all the corresponding work that accompanies this subduing and the bearing and raising of offspring. Surely, if Adam and Eve had children before the Fall, those children would have gotten their fingers and toes dirty as they romped through the garden. Surely, Eve would have had to work at cleaning them, preparing their food, and telling them stories about God. Adam would have much work tending the garden... planting, pruning, transplanting, harvesting. As the population increased, homes would need to be built and communities developed. All this work is necessary even without the entrance of sin.

Herman Bavinck reminds us that it is important to have a proper perspective on work. He writes "God's act of creation and his creational, natural gifts to humanity all precede the redemption begun with the call of Abraham." I think what he is stating is that God does not give us work as a means to solve our sin problem. Sin came *after* the

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command to work. God did not institute human work as His plan for salvation. Work will not save us. Its purpose is not salvific. It does not carry upon its shoulders the fruits and blessings of salvation.

That is not the purpose of work nor the "good work" that we do. I think there are three main purposes to work. First, when we engage in work, we are instruments in the hands of God as He sees to the care and governance of His creation. When the powers and complexities of God's creation are explored and developed (which happens through human work), God is more and more exalted as the King and Creator of it all. Secondly, we are serving our neighbor when we engage in work... whether that is passing them a sack of cheeseburgers at the drive-thru or filling a cavity in a rotting tooth. Finally, we work because that is how God cares and provides for us. Food does not magically appear in our cupboards by means of prayer or by means of the sacraments. Even the Romish monks who devoted their lives to prayer needed to tend their own gardens and maintain their own livestock. Our daily bread is provided through the God-appointed means of your or someone else's work. Paul reminds us "that if any would not work, neither should he eat" (II Thess. 3:10).

We do not work to be saved; we are saved and thus able to work to God's glory. Through Christ, we are set free to work. We are set free to engage in work that serves our neighbor and serves our King.

As we begin this new school year, my prayer is that the students will learn the value and the importance of their work. Their work as a student is not field work. It does not require them to get their hands dirty or to build sweat on their brow. But it is a kind of work, nonetheless. They will be given tasks and they will be handed expectations.

We will spoil their perspective on this work if we teach them that they need to study to get an "A," or in order to get "a good paying job." Sure, there is often a corresponding result from such work, but that ought not be the goal or the motivation. We will deform their understanding of work (and of God) if they think they will merit something from God (or us) if they work at their studies hard enough. Indeed, they will need to work hard. They will need to focus on their task and complete it as well as they can. But not because it gives *them* value and importance, but because *work* is valuable and important in itself.

A child' prayer as they begin the school year

Dear Lord, thou art the Potter and I am your clay. Even though I may be small, thou hast made me for Thy good pleasure. I was not created to serve myself, but I was created to serve Thee, my King. Thank you for giving me work to do at school and at home. *Thank you for giving me a good mind and a strong* body to do this work. Help me not to be selfish and proud or to get discouraged as I work and learn at school. I know I am small, but thou art big. Use me for Thy glory. May my studies at school help me serve Thee better. And may I more and more help my family, friends, and neighbors. For Jesus' sake, Amen.



- School Entry: Just a reminder that during the school day, all school doors will be locked. All visitors can enter the building through Door A.
- If a student stays home because of an illness or any other reason, the <u>office</u> must be informed prior to 9 AM by a phone call or parent signed note. Otherwise, they will be issued an **unexcused tardy**.
- **Tardy:** Please be reminded that any student who arrives at school after the 2nd bell has run (8:15a) will be issued a tardy. If the tardy is due to a legitimate reason, the parents must notify school that morning and it will be considered an **excused tardy**; otherwise, they will be given an **unexcused tardy**. Students cannot excuse themselves.
- If a student must leave during school hours, the student needs to obtain a "check-out slip" from the teacher. This slip must be given to the office before leaving school. The student will remain in the office area until a parent arrives. If the student returns the same day, he must stop at the office to get a "check-in slip". The student will not be allowed back into the classroom without this slip.
- Dress Code reminders:
 - Please send students to school with good sturdy footwear that covers the toes. No slippers, flip-flops, or sandals.
 - Some changes have been made to the dress code policy to add clarity. Note especially the following:
 For 6th 8th students, shorts or skirts must be longer than their fingertips. Cutoffs and spandex are not appropriate. Leggings and yoga pants are not considered pants and, therefore, must be covered with a top that is longer than their fingertips.
 - If a dress code violation occurs, your child will be issued a violation slip requiring your signature.
- Pick up and drop off: Morning drop-off can occur in either parking lot. If you have younger students, it is best to use the north parking lot (by the playground and baseball field area) since it prevents them from walking around school. Please pull into a parking spot to drop off your children. Stopping your car where other cars are coming and going is a safety problem and will cause congestion if everyone else starts to do it. End of day pick up will occur in the north parking lot.
